Discussion Starters

- 3. Why do you think Luke places this story so close to the events of Jesus arriving in Jerusalem?
- 4. Why doesn't Jesus UNHEAL the nine men who did not return to give thanks to God?

Readings for this day

Jeremiah 29:1, 4-17 The text describes Jeremiah's letter to the people Nebuchadnezzar took into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. The Lord instructs them to bloom where they are planted, to seek and pray.

Psalm 66:1-12 The psalm is a song of praise to God, who has delivered the people from adversity and enemies. God has tested people but not allowed them to decrease and decline.

2 Timothy 2:8-15 The passage underscores the importance of remembering to whom we owe our lives. By enduring we will be rewarded, and God will be faithful no matter what.
